What's happening to the 31 bus?

The County Council has now told us that its subsidy for the 31 bus will be withdrawn in September 2013.

They have also promised to 'consult with the local community' about their transport needs and aim to have 'as good or better alternative transport' ready to go when the bus subsidy ends.

It's very concerning that for the first lot of bus subsidy cuts in September of this year (including part of the Citi 7 route, and also the 101) there are no viable alternative transport arrangements yet in sight. Hopefully by the time September 2013 comes around, progress will have been made. Last week I attended a transport workshop called 'Enhancing Positive Deviance' which I think meant that we need to think in new ways. However, the fact remains that for those people who need the 31 bus, it's rather important.

My colleague in the Duxford division and I are tackling this together as the 31 runs through many villages, and I will keep you posted. Meanwhile please don't hesitate to get in touch with any queries. I've put a longer explanation of what's happening on my website.

OPERATION TWIST - online reporting facility

People will be able to report suspicious activity online for the first time.

The facility is part of Operation Twist, the crackdown on rural burglaries in Huntingdonshire and South Cambs. People can report suspicious activity in the two districts through the force website or via email.

Det Insp Jon McAdam, who is leading Operation Twist, said: "Offenders will often visit an area in the days leading up to a burglary to scope out potential targets.

"It's at this point that people are most likely to notice something unusual but may not think it is worth reporting.

"We want descriptions of these people and any vehicle details that may be linked to them.

"We appreciate that not everyone may want to phone through with this type of information and hope the online facility will provide an effective way of doing this.

"However, if people suspect there is a burglary in process then they should always dial 999."

Patrols continue to be increased in rural villages, as well as investigative and forensic work to target those responsible.

Det Insp McAdam added: "Forensic and analytical work
