## CHISHILL MOURNS TWO WELL KNOWN PERSONALITIES

January saw the loss of two prominent and well loved citizens with the deaths of Andrew Gardiner and Jim Brearley. Parish Council Clerk Sarah Scott, who worked with and knew them both well, has written these tributes.

James 'Jimbo' Brearley was one of those characters who once met, is never forgotten. He had a warmth and generosity which knew no bounds and a heart as big as his beloved native Yorkshire.

You see, when Jimbo decided to do something he throw everything at it. The 'Red Book' being a prime example produced by Jimbo to celebrate the Millennium, picturing every house in the village and most current residents with some 'blurb' about then. Jim painstakingly put this together and had it printed – it is a fabulous book.

The mischievous side of Jim was evident when he 'blagged' his way back stage at a Van Morrison Gig (not sure I would

mess with 'Van the Man') and got to meet him - all because his daughter Sarah and he shared a great love of Van's song 'Brown Eyed Girl'.

Jimbo was immensely proud of his family. His wife Pauline meant the world to him. He had two children, Simon and Sarah and four



grandchildren who he adored - Jim had a natural empathy with children. Jim was so proud of

what Simon and Sarah had achieved in their family and professional lives. He owned a successful toy company, Tolo Toys (which Pauline helped to run) and his products were simple, but brilliant. He enjoyed fishing and would often disappear with his rods for many hours. Music was a passion he shared with his son Simon. They regularly jammed together and who can forget the fantastic concert they both played in only last summer in the Village Hall? An entertaining and moving evening.

When Jimbo was diagnosed with Stage 4 cancer in June 2016, there was an air of total disbelief, but Pauline was so strong during his illness, and this very close knit family managed to support one another through an ugly time. Maybe that is the wrong word, as Jim set himself many positive and joyful goals throughout his illness: celebrating his 70<sup>th</sup> and his Mothers 100<sup>th</sup> birthdays, getting back out to Spain, visiting fine restaurants and having a great big happy family Christmas.

Jimbo did so many good things. He served on the Parish Council, set up the Windmill Trust, created the tennis club, organised the Millennium Ball, the list goes on...... There is just one more thing I want to say to Jimbo: "Jim love, make mine a Becks in a tart's glass!"

Andrew Gardiner was a tremendous asset to the



village in his role of Chairman of the Parish Council. A Parish Councillor since 2004, he was a real 'doer', getting things done in his own, unique style. At meetings, he was thoughtful, witty and to the point, and I for one, always looked forward to meetings under his chairmanship. What people might

not realise is that he did so much and liked nothing more than a good project or problem to painstakingly research and get stuck into.

Outside of the Parish Council, Andrew was a keen sportsman, regularly playing real tennis, squash and tennis. He, Kate and friends also liked to explore the UK and Europe on walking holidays. He was an exceptionally pro-active Chairman of the Cambridgeshire Care Network, a challenging role which saw him tackle issues such as funding cuts head-on and he never shied away from the responsibility of the job in hand.

Andrew was hugely respected by his Parish Councillors, District Councillors and our County Councillor; meetings will never be the same and his personality has left a huae void.

To Kate, Oliver, Alex and Melissa, the Parish Council sends our love and deepest sympathy - Andrew was a true star and a one-off character; we will miss his wry smile, his unique guips, sound judgement and luminosity.

### What's going on at Little Chishill Church?

Little Chishill's St Nicholas Church has been in need of urgent roof repairs for some time, and raising the cost of repairs would have been more than a challenge. But last year the church was fortunate to be one of just three churches in Chelmsford Diocese to receive a Dept. of Culture, Media and Sport grant from its special fund for church roof repairs.

After months of preparatory work by architects, structural engineers, builders and the bat inspector, scaffolding went up in early October and work is now well under way. Removal of the tiles revealed more rot than expected in the overboarding. Putting this right is understandably delaying completion of the work. Whilst the December service could go ahead as the roofing was still pretty much in place, and well protected, regrettably there will be no Little Chishill service in February. Repairs should be competed by March/April.

The Parish Council met during January and one of the agenda items was to set the Precept. It was unanimously agreed to keep the Precept at its current rate of £22,500, for the third year running.
