RING IN THE NEW.....

As Great Chishill rings in another New Year, it's a good time to remember the bells that have served the village for 330 years. Jean Wiseman tells the story.

The five bells in St Swithun's Church tower have an interesting story, and may be unique. The Treble, 2nd 3rd and 4th, all dated 1686, have the inscription 'William and Philip Wightman, London', and the Tenor 'Thomas Mears II London 1841'. In 1892 the bells fell down when the tower collapsed. It was rebuilt in 1895, the bells returned to their rightful place, and ringing was possible again. In 1977 ringing had to be stopped yet again, as the bells were deemed unsafe and remained silent even for special events. But in 1998 the village was asked what they would like to do to celebrate the Millennium. The result of the survey was "We want to hear our church bells ring out." So with the help of some experts and village volunteers we managed to get the bells ringing again. We collected spare parts such as redundant pieces of wheel from other churches, and the village raised nearly £20,000. Five expert ringers carefully tried out the bells and a very brave man sat (with ear protection) watching each one to ensure that they were safe. Most of the villagers gathered in the church and churchyard to listen to their bells ringing again, together with a large number who had never heard them before. Everyone was so thrilled and some of the older villagers had tears in their eyes. Of course, now we had to persuade some people to learn to ring. With the enormous dedication and instruction of Fred and Mary Bone from Stansted and Rosemary Dean, we managed to get started and we were able to ring for the millennium. Recently we have been very pleased to welcome some newcomers.

The tower renovations are complete but we still plan to have the bells completely refurbished, replacing the frames and adding a sixth bell. We have raised over £30,000, and we want to get started on the project as soon as we can - but I think we will have to try to at least double this amount.

Initially I trained as a Geologist and worked in the



oil industry for 10 years in the UK, US and Colombia. I spent time at the rig, but mostly managed Core Analysis Laboratories evaluating rock cores taken from exploration wells.

children, I became a woman returner at the Imperial War Museum Duxford's Department for Learning. I also worked in Airfield Services organising Air Shows and dealing with finance. I decided to gain further qualifications and gained a Master's Degree from Leicester University in 'Learning and Visitor Studies in Museums and Galleries'. This qualification enabled me to become Learning Officer at the American Air Museum at Duxford. After14 years there, I decided to move to the Cambridge American Cemetery and have worked there for just over three years. I am the Cemetery's Interpretive Guide, leading visitor tours that describe the role of the American Battle Monuments Commission and give a historical context to this World War II cemetery. I also carry out research into the personal histories of those commemorated in order to weave their stories into the narrative.

Since coming to Great Chishill 27 years ago, I have brought up a family, the youngest of whom was born here, and who all think of themselves as local. Felicity, Miles, Guy and Polly were educated mostly at Chrishall Primary School and Newport Free Grammar School. I believe that to be part of the community you have to get involved, and being a Parish Councillor fulfils that criterion – it is my small way of paying something back for being able to live in such a beautiful environment, by helping to safeguard it for future generations.
