FROM OUR DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS

NEW COUNTY COUNCIL SET-UP

The recent council elections altered the balance of power at Cambridgeshire County Council, so that no political party has overall control. The minority groups voted to end the Cabinet and Leader system of governance and revert to the committee system which served the council previously. Under the committee system all councillors play a role in the decision-making process, making the council's work more transparent and all councillors more accountable. Legally, this change cannot happen until May 2014. Until then, the largest group, the Conservatives, will run a final year of the Cabinet and Leader model, as a minority administration.

LOCAL PLAN - massive growth for Melbourn area rejected On the other side of the A505, the proposed 270 homes for Melbourn have been removed from the Draft South Cambrigeshire Local Plan. This was to have been situated on the north side of New Road. A much smaller development of 65 homes remains in the Plan, for the south side of New Road. This has obvious consequences for the wider area, including capacity on the A505. Cambridge and South Cambs as a whole are set to grow in staggering proportion - 33,000 new homes by 2031. New towns are proposed at Waterbeach and Bourn. This requires a dramatic improvement to transport infrastructure and consequently the County Council will be publishing a transport strategy for consultation over the summer.

POT HOLES: EMERGENCY REPAIRS ONLY

While the County Council has committed £90 million over five years to improving Cambridgeshire's network of roads, pavements and cycleways, South Cambs is to see only a little over £100K for capital works to the network in the coming year. This includes only a stretch of highways resurfacing in Little Chishill. This means that the vast majority of highways works in our villages will involve the filling of potholes, rather than longer-term road and pavement restoration.
