The Bowls Club meets each Thursday at the Village Hall at 7-30 until 9-30.

We have about 33 members and each week between 16 and 24 attend

Carpet bowls probably originated as a substitute for outdoors bowls and it remains a winter game. We close down between mid May and September.

It is similar to Green bowls but as the mat is only the length of the Hall, a central barrier is positioned to force players to use the bias on the bowls to avoid it. Fundamentally, the aim of the game is to get as close to the "jack" (a smaller white ball) as possible.

The delight of bowls, I find, is that it sits happily between a sport, a game and a social gathering. Of course, we do our best, but mostly, we enjoy the fun of the fluke, or the banter of who is closest. Normally we play in

teams of four, against another four, and as we have three mats, 24 people can be playing at the same time. This means that there is not a lot of hanging around, yet there is time for chats between turns. This format also mixes people up, so we find ourselves with different groups throughout the evening. Our members are all young (at heart) and are a random cross section of the village and beyond. We are welcoming to new members, who find it easy to be integrated into the club.

CHINESE LANTERNS

Although described as biodegradable, these lanterns are constructed of a canopy attached to a wire or bamboo frame and contain a fuel cell attached to a thin metal wire. When lit they float upwards and can travel up to 15 miles. They eventually float down to earth; the canopy should then biodegrade, leaving a thin wire which, if ingested, can be lethal to cattle or can become entangles around the legs of any wild or pet animal. We have already picked up three

of these lanterns on our farm this year and just outside Saffron Walden 18 have been collected.
