steaks, lamb shank and (of course) fish and chips and Sunday lunch. Even when the new chef does appear, the emphasis in the kitchen will still be firmly on traditional fare, says Mark. Are Mark and Debs pleased they came to the Chishills? The answer's a definite yes – the children are very happy and doing well at their school in Chrishall. Mark and Debbie love the area, although, they say, they haven't seen nearly enough of it and want to explore more – the pub's popular with walkers, and it would be good to tell them more about the locality from first hand experience. It's been a challenge, say Mark and Debbie, and sometimes tiring – but they are feeling positive and looking forward to welcoming guests to a re-launched Pheasant in April. And, says Debbie, there will definitely be another Easter Egg hunt for the children to enjoy this year!

## Profile: Parish Clerk Sarah Scott

I am now in my 10<sup>th</sup> year as the Clerk or Proper Officer to Great and Little Chishill Parish Council. I undertake a wide range of duties over and above setting the agenda and taking minutes – broadly advising the Parish Council on policy and procedure,



and ensuring everything the PC does complies with our legal requirements, and looking after the PC's finances.

During my time I have seen changes to the membership of the Parish Council. I have also trained and passed Cilca (Certificate in Local Council Administration), which is fast becoming a prerequisite to becoming a Proper Officer. Last year we successfully implemented GDPR, which necessitated incorporating lots of new procedures and policies. I also maintain the security database.

Behind the scenes, I receive many emails / phone calls about general day to day issues within the village; these mostly are about potholes, gritting, trees, speeding and footpaths. What is a trivial issue to some people is a big deal to others, so everything must be given thought and balance. Mostly these are jobs, I can quietly get on with behind the scenes and report back at meetings. Yes, it is a satisfying and interesting job and yes, there are challenges. The challenges are in part due to what we, as a Parish Council can physically organise and do ourselves and managing our Parishioners expectations. Due to cost cuts at District and County level, actually getting to talk to the correct person to help us out can be frustrating. We are lucky to be supported by our District Councillor, Deb Roberts and County Councillor, Peter Topping. Over the years, I have forged good relationships with key personnel at District Level, but I am finding that things tend to take a lot longer to process now, than they did 10 years ago.

I have lived in Great Chishill on and off for 47 years and as such have witnessed all levels of village life, from being a youngster playing at the swings (as they were then called) making dens on the Plaistow, being a grumpy teenager, a mum with a baby to a mother of a teenager. I am married to Tim, a former Parish Councillor (who has lived in the village for 25 years) and we have a daughter Harriet.

I also work as a Teaching Assistant at St Faith's School in Cambridge.
