MASTERMIND IN THE VILLAGE

If you thought you'd seen a familiar face on BBC 2's Mastermind in October, you most probably did; it was Robin Healey. In a very close contest, Robin chose artist John Piper as his specialist subject when he was beaten into 4th place by only one point. Robin has lived in Great Chishill since 1995 and describes himself as a historian and biographer. His wide range of interests including gardening, botany, maps, art, architecture, cricket, pétangue and, of course, guizzes, stood him in

good stead for the general knowledge round. When applying for the third time to become a contestant for Mastermind in January of this year he had to name his most embarrassing moment, and needless to say, offer three subjects and his sources. For his latest television appearance, he found waiting his turn worse than sitting in The Chair in the dark and being guestioned. Contestants wait in the Green Room as several rounds are recorded at the same time before an audience of about 300. The live audience makes the experience more dramatic than the radio version. But Robin is no quiz novice, having been a contestant on the radio version of Mastermind with Peter Snow as the guizmaster in 2000, and on the TV version of Brain of Britain as a student as well as on satellite TV in Say the Word which he says was worse than Mastermind. Nearer to home, he's a member of the Pheasant Pluckers (no spoonerisms, please) Team that has guizzed with some success.

Apart from his life as a "quizzee", Robin is currently writing the biography of another writer, Geoffrey Grigson and is also compiling a Gazetteer of Landscape Artists in the UK and Ireland. We wish Robin every success

in his future contests and work.
