

St Swithun's: A Towering Achievement!

Flushed with pride St Swithun's Appeal Committee, assisted by Great Chishill Bell Ringers, welcomed an audience of 100 to celebrate the

completion of essential repairs to the church tower and long-overdue installation of water supply and drainage so the church can become 'fit for future generations' with a fully accessible toilet, and in 2019, flexible, accessible space at the tower end of the church with new flooring and kitchen facilities. Rosemary Gadian explained that the fundraising events supported by so many of our audience, standing orders and donations had raised a total of £85,000 in 4 years! Special thanks were given to the Summer Ball Committee whose two events had raised £24,000.



With a Heritage Lottery Fund grant totalling £255,200, grants from Jack Patston Charitable Trust, Cambridgeshire Historic Churches Trust and the All Churches Trust the total amount generated by the Appeal Committee stands at £343,200. So huge thanks to all our supporters.



Having spent hours researching in county records offices in Cambridge, Chelmsford and elsewhere, Celina Fox introduced her fascinating History and Guide to St Swithun's. A 15C wall painting of the Martyrdom of St Lawrence was sketched by our 1841 rector, and it is now in the British Museum. Read more in Celina's history!

Jill Kuenzi introduced the first in a series of cycling routes starting from St Swithun's, with evocative

descriptions of wild flowers - and a close encounter with hounds! Heritage Lottery funding applicants must make fundraising efforts of their own – box ticked - and show they are encouraging more people to use buildings for community and heritage purposes – another box ticked with these publications. Angus Gent introduced a Key Stage 1 resource to interest children in the church and churchvard then talked about researching the graves and the stories behind the names on our war memorial.

After the interval and copious refreshments (much thanks to Tess Gent her helpers and some of our guests), everyone was held spellbound by a selection from Peter Wiseman's vast collection of historical local photographs - with additional stories and comments from Janet Crouch and Becks Pine.

But it doesn't end here. We need another £7,500 to complete the interior improvements described above.

The East Anglian Searchers have visited Little Chishill, Barkway and Reed and are back to explore the fields beside the windmill on 6 and 7 October. They take pride in leaving the field looking as if no one has touched it - yet they always unearth interesting artefacts, including Roman and mediaeval silver coins, pieces of harness and a mass of musket balls! Detectorists pay to join the search and raise more money during the day from refreshments and raffles. They do this with a view to donating to a charity as well as paying the landowner for access. They gave £790 to the windmill last October, and courtesy of Mrs Diana Duke, all proceeds from this search will be donated to the Windmill Trust. They also intend to give some of their finds to be housed in the windmill when it is completed.
