# SUBSIDIZED BUSES: STAY OF EXECUTION From: Liberal Democrat Community Newsletter For Foxton, Heydon, Melbourn, Meldreth, Shepreth and the Chishills

The County Council's decision last February to cut 100% of its bus subsidies has been challenged with an application for Judicial Review, on grounds of flawed consultation and equalities obligations. In response, the council has announced that it will review its budget decision. Susan brought a motion to a July County Council meeting proposing that this review encompass all subsidy withdrawals including those already implemented on April 17<sup>th</sup>, and the council administration now confirms that this will happen. Hopefully the new 'review' will mean that those residents who are less mobile and lack independent transport will be meaningfully consulted. The consultation will run from September to November.
