St George's Day April 23

St. George, revered in both Christian and secular contexts. embodies the valour and faith celebrated through centuries. Thought to be born in Cappadocia, modern-day Turkey, in the late 3rd century, he served as a Roman soldier under Emperor Diocletian. His unwavering commitment to his Christian faith led him to defy the Emperor and he was executed for refusing to make a sacrifice in honour of the pagan gods. Iconic tales depict his famed encounter with a dragon,



symbolizing the triumph of good over evil, faith over adversity. Through this story, St. George epitomizes courage, resilience, and unwavering devotion to God's will. His steadfastness amid trials continues to inspire Christians worldwide.

Although St George never visited England, his reputation for virtue and holiness spread across Europe and his feast day – the 23rd April – was celebrated in England from the 9th century onwards. He became popular with English kings. Edward I (1272-1307) had banners bearing the emblem of St George (a red cross on a white background) and Edward III (1327-77) had a strong interest in the saint and owned a relic of his blood. The St George cross was not used to represent England until the reign of Henry VIII.

In commemorating St. George, we are reminded of the timeless values he represents: bravery in the face of adversity, steadfast faith, and the enduring power of goodness.



Dorcas Society

When I start researching these articles I never really know what I might find. I have an idea of what I'm looking for, and where, but like to allow the history itself to tell its stories. This time I was looking for an Elmdon link and started by looking for Wilkes, a name I am seeing a lot at the moment as I am working on a field map for Chrishall. So I did a search for Wilkes and came up with some old church newsletters. This one from December 1905 caught my eye: "The last Dorcus Meeting was held at the Vicarage on Tuesday, November 14th, when the garments made during the year were allotted to various people in the parishes."

Who, or what, were the Dorcus group? An internet search revealed the following:

"Early Dorcas Societies revolved around the front rooms of middleclass women, meeting to make textiles, with money raised for materials by each woman in the group. The finished products would then be distributed to deserving poor in the parish."

Why "Dorcus" I thought? I'm sure many of you will be ahead of me here with the following from the Bible: Acts 9:36 Now there was in Joppa a disciple named Tabitha, which, translated, means Dorcas. She was full of good works and acts of charity.

So what do we know of this group of ladies who met in Elmdon Vicarage around the turn of the last century?

In the December 1903/January 1904 edition of the Church News it was reported that the garments that had been made by the Dorcus Society during the year were distributed and consisted of 12 night dresses, 12 flannel petticoats and 26 shirts. They were given to "widows and other deserving cases".

In the March/April Church News of 1905 Mrs O Prime was collecting subscriptions for the Dorcus Society who were meeting at the Vicarage on the 2nd Wednesday in each month. There were 26 ladies and one man, John Wilkes, who were subscribers and it seems they may have given what they could afford – ranging from Mrs Bailey with a donation of £1, 1 shilling, and Mrs R Housden with a donation of 1 shilling. There are regular bills from Mrs Chater and Mrs Wabon, perhaps for buying materials for they were the wives of the two grocers and drapers that had shops in Elmdon main street. In March 1906 there are still 27 subscribers although Mrs Bailey has now become Lady Bailey. (I suspect the 1905 title of "Mrs" was in error. Lady Bailey was presumably married to Sir James Bailey who lived at Lofts Hall.) And in 1908 with 25 subscribers the Society is still going strong. I don't know how long the Society existed. But I hope you have enjoyed that little dip into one of the activities that was keeping Elmdon ladies busy early last century. The Archive will be open this year with the first date being Sunday 26th May - 2 -4.30pm. Other dates are on our website. Do pop along and say hello. Rosemarie Gant, Chrishall Village Archive

Marathon Endeavour

On Sunday 21st April, 24 year old Harry Wilkinson of Wenden Lofts will be running the London Marathon to raise money for Khandel Light, despite only distance running for just over a year. For more than 20 years, Khandel Light has been working to improve the lives of vulnerable and disadvantaged families in Khandel and 26 surrounding villages in the desert State of Rajasthan, India. 


