What makes Christmas?

What was the most memorable Christmas you've ever had? Two Christmases come to mind for me.

The first was over 40 years ago, up in the Yorkshire Dales where my parents had recently moved to. At the head of Nidderdale there is a little church that offers a spectacular view down the dale.

My parents, brothers and I joined the small congregation to celebrate midnight communion on Christmas eve. As we did so, unbeknown to us, an inch of snow fell. When we emerged that Christmas morning, the sky had cleared and the moon risen. The view of twinkling household lights amidst the glistening snow was simply breathtaking. We just stood there in awe.

In contrast, I was dreading a Christmas a few years later. I was single and had been living in Ethiopia for 18 months, working as a water engineer in rural communities through the local church. Ethiopia is a wonderful country but for foreigners, it can seem very strange. Their Ge'ez calendar is based on the ancient Coptic calendar, which is seven to eight years behind our Gregorian calendar. And being predominantly Orthodox, Ethiopia celebrates Christmas when we celebrate the wise men bringing gifts at Epiphany, on January 6th. So December 25th is just another regular working day.

I had just moved to a new location down-country with yet another tribal language I didn't speak, I didn't know anyone well, and it was very hot. The thought of "In the bleak midwinter" just made me feel more isolated. There was zero chance of snow and not a Christmas tree in the whole country. 'Christmas' had every potential to be a disaster, and a very lonely one.

But the local church kindly suggested I travel to the capital where a few other Western expat missionaries also faced the same prospect of a very unusual time, culturally.

So we focussed on what Christmas was really about, and it was of the best Christmases I had (before getting married I hasten to add!). However, I am very aware that for some – perhaps you - Christmas can be a time of great loneliness. There may be fractious

Adoration of the Magi

This painting is one of Saffron Walden Museum's early acquisitions. It is an oil painting on canvas and it stands at approximately 4.5 metres high and 3 metres wide.

The painting is by Ramsay Richard Reinagle (1775-1862), an English portrait, landscape and animal painter.

Reinagle was a pupil of his father, Philip Reinagle, also a painter, and he followed his style. He exhibited at the Royal Academy in London from as early as 1788 before studying in Rome and Holland. He returned to London and painted panoramas of

cities such as Rome, Naples and Paris, as well as making copies of Old Masters.

Reinagle painted three copies of religious paintings by Paul Raul Rubens, the Flemish painter – *The Crucifixion, The Adoration of the Magi* (the museum's painting) and *The Entombment*. Reinagle's copies were exhibited in Pall Mall, London in 1819 and a review of the exhibition in *The New Monthly Magazine* described them as having "as much of the spirit, power, glow and unction of Rubens' style as we could have well expected in copies".

In about 1842, *The Adoration of the Magi* was bought by William Davidson for £13, on behalf of Francis Gibson, a member of the Quaker Gibson family of Saffron Walden. In 1843, it was presented by Gibson as a gift to the town museum.

Initially the painting was displayed in the museum but it was attacked by vandals. It was restored in the 1880s.

In 1943, an agreement was made with Holy Trinity Church, Chrishall that they would take the painting on a long-term loan and display it in the church.

By the early 1990s the painting was beginning to deteriorate. It had been hung too close to the wall, and some of the paint was flaking off.

Julie Crick, a picture restorer based in Linton, carried out a thorough restoration relining & restretching it and patching the flaking paintwork. She also added the gold leaf surround.

The painting is still on display in Holy Trinity, Chrishall so why not go along and see the painting in all its glory!

Burns Suppers

A Burns supper is a celebration of the life and poetry of the poet Robert or Rabbie Burns, widely regarded as the national poet of Scotland. The suppers are normally held on or near the poet's birthday, 25 January, known as Burns Night. The first supper was held at Burns Cottage by his friends, on 21 July 1801, the fifth anniversary of his death; it has been a regular occurrence ever since. Burns suppers may be formal or informal. They typically include haggis (a traditional Scottish dish celebrated by Burns in *Address to a Haggis*), Scotch whisky and the recitation of Burns' poetry. See back cover for details


Burns' Address to a Haggis:

St David's Small(est) City with a Big Heart



We have been to St Davids, there on the furthest outcrop of the Pembrokeshire Peninsula, three times over the years - each visit making a lasting impression. The city is situated only a stone's throw (well, comfortable walking distance) from the beautiful West Wales coast. The Cathedral, in its purple-grey splendour, stands by the River Alun amongst the trees. Situated in a dip, all but the tower heights are hidden from view until you are very close.

There are some things that make St David's special.

- A rich history of settlement going back some 6,000 years.
- Dewi Sant (St David) was born in AD 500 to St Non, just south of the city and baptised in Porth Clais nearby. Following a religious upbringing, he was ordained a priest, working locally at first before travelling to England, Brittany and even Jerusalem.
- A monastery was founded by Dewi Sant in AD550, where St David's Cathedral sits today. It was sacked many times by Viking raiders.
- The cathedral that now stands proudly dates from the 12th century and is the final resting place of St David. It is built of local stone from nearby Solva - hence its colour, and has an unusual wooden vaulted ceiling, emulated in King's College Chapel, Cambridge.

• The establishment of the Commonwealth of England under Oliver Cromwell was felt enormously in St David's with the cathedral being decimated by Cromwell's forces - roof lead was stolen and stained glass smashed. Repair of some two hundred years of neglect and vandalism was put right from 1793 and continues to the present day.

St David's attracts people holidaying in the coastal plain above the wild cliffs and rocks of Pembrokeshire, enjoying walking and coasteering, as well as throngs of pilgrims to the Cathedral.

The external architecture is something to behold and is surpassed only by the beauty inside. It is hard to believe that it was once in a state of such disrepair that the tower was in danger of collapsing. The unusual slope of the nave floor, put down to early subsidence, enhances the feeling of looking up to the altar and inner confines.

In our recent stay, we managed to get along to an evensong service with full choir which would have been special in itself. However, it was no ordinary evensong as we had stumbled into a service with Bishop Dorrien attending to receive a copy of the St John's Bible Heritage Edition that has been gifted to 299 places around the world, including Canterbury Cathedral, Lambeth Palace, The Vatican, Buckingham Palace and St David's no less.

School News

It is approaching Christmas again and with that comes school Nativity plays and carol concerts to prepare and perform. We all learn about the Christmas story in our RE lessons and ask questions to delve deeper into the theology.

Reception children ask why people perform a Nativity play. (I have asked this myself when we are half way through rehearsals!) They discover the way stories have shaped our lives as Christians and how this story has changed the world.

Gifts are the theme for year 1 and 2. Why was Jesus given as a gift to the world? And What gifts would be we bring to the baby Jesus today? The first enquiry asks us to think about what needs saving in the world and what it means to turn back to God. The second question prompts us to think about how we see Jesus in the world and in our lives and what symbols would demonstrate that.

The older children ask, What is the most significant part in the Nativity? (To which the children in KS1 will always say the part they played in the show!) It is easy to assume Jesus will be their answer, but we have had some super discussions in the past about why it is the shepherds or Mary. And Year 5 and 6 ask, Do Christmas celebrations and traditions help Christians understand who Jesus was and why he was born? I think we will all have special moments or events that kickstart that Christmassy feeling in us. In Worship Team we spoke about this and for Wil it is when the Carols and Christmas songs come on the radio. Imogen likes seeing presents appear under the tree and loves giving gifts to her friends and family and Oliver said when they get the decorations out to put up at home he feels "Very Jolly, Jolly, jolly!"

We send our best wishes to you al this Christmas and hope you can find some peace amongst the bustle to enjoy the wonder of the season.
